Reach & Impact

- Noora Health has trained over 10.6 million caregivers across more than 10,900 hospitals and clinics in India, Bangladesh, and Indonesia.
- The <u>program</u> reduces cardiac surgery complications by 71%, newborn readmissions by 56%, and neonatal mortality by 18%.

Future Vision

By 2028, Noora Health will expand to reach over 70 million caregivers and patients across India, Bangladesh, Indonesia, and Nepal.
